This concerns the policy of Mensa in setting annual and life membership fees. My main gripe is the cost and lack of an actuarial schedule for the life memberships. At \$600 for everybody, regardless of age, I can't imagine many people signing us for life if they are over 35. A young person of about 20 should have a life expectancy of almost 60 years. Not so for someone in their 50's. It means that a new Mensan age twenty will pay about \$10 per year for a life membership, while a person age 55 or older would pay \$30 to \$40 per year. Some Bargain!

I can't believe that an international organization whose basis of membership is I.Q. doesn't have a few actuaries, accountants, lawyers, etc. Any one of them could figure out a longevity table that would be fair to members of all ages. Every fraternal organization to which I belong bases life membership on a sliding schedule. Had Mensa has a similar policy when I joined, I would have become a life member immediately. However, at age 54, I can't see paying three to four times as much as a younger person.
