I try to imagine zooming through space, a la Einstein, but no dice. I try zipping past galaxies back to the beginning but I don't get far. As I'm looking at the center of a particular galaxy I wonder if the black hole or chunk of something there so dense and spinning so rapidly that light just can't catch up that maybe, just maybe, its only dark because someone totally forgot to pay the electric bill.

And if it is a vortex, like an ocean eddy, and sucking in stars faster than two

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I have been told that, after speaking with a native New Yorker, I speak with a New York accent. That may have been true many years ago, but not now. It is getting harder and harder to find someone with a New York accent. My history is one reason. I lived in New York during my formative years; until I left New York for the Army. I have not been back for more than a visit since then. Once I left New York, I lived in English speaking communities composed of Americans from all parts of the U. S. We all are imitators. We tend to match the accent of the person to whom we are talking. Being faced with the multitudinous accents of my compatriots, first in the army, then with the American expatriates working in foreign countries like Greece, Japan, and Florida, my own accent flattened.

The distinct regional accents of American and British English, began to lessen, and in some cases disappear, after WWII. Two causes fostered this. The increased mobility of the population was one, my own family is an example. We live in Florida, my wife is from Texas, our kids live in Oregon, California, and North Carolina. Our grandkids have parents who were raised in Florida, Japan, Tennessee, and Canada. This increased mobility of Americans and British reduced the regional accents of those moving and the regional accents of the communities in which they were living.

The second cause is movies and television. The whole world watches American and British productions. To attract general audiences, producers have required actors to speak in non-regional accents. Even in *My Fair Lady*, where the premise is replacing Lisa Doolittle's Cockney speech with "proper English", Lisa's Cockney is toned down so that the un-Cockney audience can comprehend her lines, but enough is left for us to understand that in the beginning she is speaking Cockney. If she were speaking Cockney of the time at which the movie is set, she would be incomprehensible to most of us.

This loss of regionalism was gradually disappearing starting with WWII, but it still existed in some extreme cases. In 1953, cycling through Italy, I teamed up with two Englishmen from Liverpool. Their accents were strong, but we usually managed. One day, they said something to me that I couldn't understand. They repeated themselves several times. Finally, they said *mangiare, mangiare!*, "let's eat!". They had to resort to Italian because I couldn't understand their English. Fifty years ago, the Beatles came to the U. S. Whether they liked it or not, everyone here could understand what they were singing.

I visited Tangier Island in Chesapeake Bay before the arrival of television. At that time the women never left the island. The only way on or off the island was by fishing boat. The men did leave, as they were fishermen and brought

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Ever since the tragedy of 9/11, hardly a day goes by without our country either being engaged in a war or having our more conservative element demanding that we become engaged in a war. As these words are being written, the latest call to war is with an Islamic extremist group known as **ISIS** (*Islamic State of Iraq and Syria*) or **ISIL** (*Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant*).

It is not my purpose here to enter into a debate as to whether or not to do battle with ISIS or ISIL since, at least to some degree, the decision already has been made. Rather, it is my concern that we, as a country, seem to feel inadequate unless we are engaged in military action somewhere in the Middle East. It seems we also do not feel good about ourselves unless we deify those we would put in harm's way in supposedly Defending the Free World.

It would be naïve to believe that, as ill-advised as our recent adventures appear to be, that our country should never engage in warfare. The question then becomes: How do we differentiate between when we must go to war and just simply doing battle for the wrong reasons? While there is no easy answer, what follows are some ideas I am offering in order to aid our leaders in making the right choice as each situation presents itself.

On other observation I shall make is the often seen slogan:

"Freedom is Not Free".

Making war does not come cheap. When President Clinton left office in January 2001, our federal budget had a considerable surplus. At the end of President Bush (the son) term, our budget was back in the red zone. Much of that was due to the Iraq War, currently estimated to cost \$1.1 trillion, or well over \$3000 for every U.S. citizen.

Ironically, the people whose drums beat the loudest in their call for war are quite often the same people who want smaller government and lower taxes. In recognition of this reality, my first recommendation is to require a tax increase sufficient to cover the cost of war. Since the working class can ill afford an additional tax burden, the best way to handle this is to add tax brackets to the upper end of the income tax scale. As freedom is not free, war requires sacrifice. Those best able to sacrifice are also the most likely beneficiaries of the true objectives behind a proposed war.

Making war also costs lives. I have also noticed that the ones who are most likely to call for war are the ones who will not actually be putting their lives in harm's way. Under current law, all males who have attained the age of 18 are required to register for the draft. Let us go a step further and reinstate the draft. In selecting their draftees, the Selective Service should keep in mind that

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those young men who are least needed to support their families should be the primary candidates for the draft. In short, this means those who are born of privilege (after all, they have benefited most from the Land of the Free) should be the first to serve in the front lines.

If we were to adopt policies such as the ones I suggest above, I believe we will go a long way to limiting our appetite for war to only those battles that are truly vital to our national security.

their catch to the mainland and had to communicate with the buyers. The women did not. I had no difficulty conversing with the men as I had to do to gain passage to the island. The women, however, spoke something akin to Elizabethan English. At first, I had difficulty understanding them, but after three days, I could converse with them. Now, Tangier Island is a popular resort with hundreds of tourists visiting. I doubt if much Elizabethan English is heard.

While driving through Scotland in 1960, once Rita and I crossed the border, communication became difficult when we occasionally stopped for directions. At one stop, we were looking for a hotel. We asked a policeman for directions. We could not fathom what he said. After several minutes of fruitless dialogue, we understood him to say, "Follow me." He hopped into his car and we in ours and drove to the hotel.

In the '50's, I was working in Greece. My boss and his wife were Greek-Americans, born and raised in Georgia. They both had a heavy Southern accent when speaking English. Sophie, that was my boss' wife, also had a distinct Georgia accent when speaking Greek.

If you listen to the people around you at any Mensa function, you will not hear much of distinctive accents, although, if you check, you will find a vast array of native origins. This is the future of English.

I'm looking for a few good readers – Mensa members who can spend some time, a few hours in late January or early February, to score scholarship essays.

The Mensa Foundation scholarship program is an essay contest that is open to all students living in the U.S. who are enrolled in a U.S. college or university in the academic year following the award. Applicants write 550-word essays that describe their educational and/or career goals. Winning essays are judged by members using Foundation criteria. Please consider being one of those judges.

This program was expanded last year to include nonparticipating local groups. Before then, students in the geographical area of these groups were ineligible to even apply.

As Assistant National Scholarship Chair in charge of Nonparticipating Groups, I'm recruiting more than 60 members from all over the U.S. to judge essays. We're looking for members who are confident in their knowledge of writing and reading skills. Of course English teachers and professional writers are welcome, but so are members from all walks of life.

Essays will be emailed to you in late January. You'll have a few weeks to read and score them in your home, though we hope it will only take an afternoon or two. You email the scores back and you're done!

You may already be planning to judge essays for another Scholarship Chair. I don't want to steal current judges from Local Groups or Regions. However, for those members who love reading essays and want to spend an additional few hours reading more, you can participate at this level with no fear of conflict of interest. Let me know which region or local group you're reading.

Your ExComm was a bit busy this month. We are working with David Fleming of CFM on supporting a local Mensa presence at this year's Megacon. Joe is also working with National to get a Mensa Banner and promotional materials.

Funding wise, we are in fairly good shape right now. We can continue our funding of the newsletter at the current levels for the half a year or so until we seat a new ExComm. That doesn't mean that we are putting off dealing with the problem, just that we will need to look at the situation again in about 6 months.

In late September the AML Board of Directors held a teleconference in order to decide whether or not to approve a contract for the 2018 Annual Gathering proposed for Indianapolis. The contract had to be signed before the next regularly scheduled meeting in December, hence the special meeting. While we were convened, we also approved the minutes of the September 6 Board meeting, and clarified two bylaws referenda which had been approved for balloting earlier, plus a new dues increase motion was placed on the agenda so it could be voted on at the December meeting. All items passed except the dues increase, for which discussion was postponed until December. A few days later we approved the minutes to the teleconference by email, and minutes for all our meetings are now available on the American Mensa website under Read > Board Meeting Reports.

Unfortunately because of the timing I was unable to notify you about this meeting in my column last month. Notices were posted to the various online venues (the AML Today email notice, the AML Community Forums at the national website, American Mensa Firehouse and American Mensa Hospitality (our two official Facebook groups), and some of the unofficial e-lists, but anyone relying solely on print media would have missed out on the announcement.

Local groups are still required to make certain that notices of all official membership and business meetings are available to their members in print if requested. No group is allowed to limit notifications only to those who choose online notifications, be they by email, websites, or social media. However, it is becoming more prevalent that unofficial items (lunch and dinner gatherings, games nights, bar meets) are circulated via social media and do not make it into the newsletters.

In Region 10, at least nine of the local groups maintain Facebook groups (only Mensa of Jacksonville, Tallahassee Mensa and Palm Beach Mensa lack a Facebook presence that I am aware of). Many of these groups (including Jacksonville) also maintain email lists, primarily via Yahoogroups. And Palm Beach County Mensa makes use of Meetup to notify their members of upcoming events.

I'm certain it's not the intention of any of these groups to disenfranchise any of their members. All official business is still available to all members. But clearly online is the direction that information is moving, and in order to make their budgets stretch as far as they can, your groups need as many members who are capable of it to be available via the online venues.

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Minutes of the October, 2014 ExComm Meeting

The ExComm met at the home of Karen Freiberg at 876 Buxmont Ct., Rockledge, FL 32955, on Tuesday, October 7th, 2014, called to order by LocSec Wynn Rostek at 6:04 pm.

Members Present: Wynn Rostek, Joe Janson, Karen Freiberg, Dennis Logan, and George Lebovitz.

Guests: George Patterson, David Fleming (Region 10 Asst. RVC).

The minutes of the August, 2014 minutes as published in the SCAM were approved. (There was no meeting in September.)

Officer/Committee Reports (details may be found in the footnotes):

Treasurer's Report: The August and September reports¹ were unanimously approved.

Testing: Testing coordinator, Hank Rhodes, reported via email²

Last month's event at the Red Ginger was well attended, well-received, and a good time was had by all. We discussed not needing to provide a speaker for these monthly events since the speaker pool is finite and merely getting together with fellow Mensans for a congenial evening and good food should be sufficient. In lieu of a speaker, we could also just have an open discussion, with some topics prepared in advance. Additionally, it was suggested that an alternative to a dinner event would be to try to obtain group discounts at local attractions.

David then gave us background information regarding the Region 10 booth at this year's Megacon in Orlando. In addition to raising money, it greatly boosted awareness of Mensa and resonated with the much desired youth demographic that SCAM is trying to stimulate. We unanimously approved donating \$100 to their activities for the coming year and hope to participate alongside Region 10. We also discussed incentives such as offering a \$10 discount voucher for testing and trying to attract "fresh blood" by visiting local establishments which conduct trivia contests and putting up a challenge to "Beat the Mensans." Continuing the discussion of how to attract younger Mensans, we also put up the notion of modernizing a game night with whatever games are currently "in." Unfortunately, the ExComm was not able to specifically identify these currently popular games and will pursue inquiries with individuals under our average age of 127.
