

But, sticking to facts, one has to remember that people lived much longer back in those days. He might have had another six or seven hundred years left and (Continued on page 13)

COUNTING II

Some specific items have their own methods of counting. For example, paper is measured in quires of 24 or 25 sheets. Twenty quires make reams of 480 or 500 sheets indicating its roots in the twenty (*Vigesimal*) base method of counting. The octal system of numbering is used in music with eight notes in an octave.

Twelve units make a dozen, used for eggs and several other commodities. A dozen dozen is a gross or 144 units, which is still used in commerce. A dozen gross is a great gross or 1728 units, now rarely used.

Another strange vigesimal method of counting occurs in French. French, like English, has special words for eleven and twelve, *onze* and *douze*, and uses the same pattern as English for twenty through seventy. At eighty it shifts to a vigesimal nomenclature, *quatre-vingt* (four twenties) and ninety, *quatre-vingt-dix* (four twenties plus ten) rather than *octante* or *huitante* and *nonante*. Swiss, Belgian, and Luxembourgian French however, use octante and nonante. The French Bourse also uses octante and nonante to avoid confusion when crying out orders.

Other less used systems of numbers are **Troy Weight**, used for precious metals. It is a mixture of the duodecimal and the twenty based systems of counting. There are twenty pennyweights in a **Troy Ounce** and twelve Troy ounces in a **Troy Pound**. This is the basis of the old system of counting British money, 20 pence equal one shilling and there are 12 shillings in a pound.

Partridges (for eating) are counted in braces (one male and one female). Precious stones are weighed in carats. Gold purity is measured in karats. Pure gold is 24 karats.

There are two common counting systems that appear to be based on the duodecimal system of counting, that is circular measurements with 360 degrees in a circle; and time, with 60 seconds in a minute, 60 minutes in an hour, and 12 or 24 hours in a day. From here it gets wild with seven days in a week, 365 or 366 days in a year, four weeks in a month or 52 weeks in a year, and 12 months in a year, none of which are exact multiples of each other.

Another complex system of counting is distance with 12 inches in a foot, three feet in a yard, six feet in a fathom, mark twain means two fathoms clearance under a Mississippi river boat, note the obvious duodecimal basis, then the counting goes irregular, 5280 feet in a mile, also a chain is 66 feet, or 100 links, or 4 rods. There are 10 chains in a furlong, and 80 chains in one statute mile.

Petroleum products are measured in barrels of 42 gallons. Beer is also (Continued on page 6)

measured and counted in barrels, but these barrels are 43 gallons.

Fruit and berries are measured in **pecks**. One peck equals two quarts and there are 16 pecks in a **bushel**.

Although in counting groups of animals the standard ordinal numbers are used, the names of the groups are individualized. For example, lions are counted in prides, wolves in packs, sheep in flocks, geese in gaggles, cattle in herds, fish in schools, apes in troops, bats in colonies, eagles in convocations, whales in pods, monkeys in barrels, owls in parliaments, and quails in coveys.

It is amazing with all this complexity, we can still count.

THE TENTH STORY

The American Mensa Board of Directors' meeting last month was productive. Among the actions taken were:

- Passed the update to the Avenues of Redress policy to cover online groups and forums
- Approved allowing parental attendance at certain gifted youth events (including test sessions)
- Kept the dues rate at current levels
- Established an equity restoration level for the 2015-2016 budget of \$25,000.

The motion to establish a national event attendance policy was postponed until the March meeting.

There was a presentation on risk management with a focus on determining proper levels of insurance and liability coverage. One of the takeaways of the meeting was for the Risk Management Committee, of which I am a member, to go over our current policies to determine if there are any shortfalls or even any areas where we may be over-insured. While it's prudent to be prepared for major eventualities, it's not wise (or economically feasible) to prepare for EVE-RY eventuality. This is an ongoing project, and I'm sure there will be more reports on the horizon.

Pam Donahoo gave a presentation on the programs that American Mensa currently supports, from programs that are growing in use and popularity (social media, MensaForKids.org) and programs which have high value to our members but low growth (MindGames, CultureQuest); to programs which are decreasing in value to our members (Mensa Gift Guide, Community Forums). A couple of figures which I found interesting were that approximately 10% of our membership is now receiving the Mensa Bulletin online, while conversely only 96 members out of over 53,000 logged into Community Forums over the past month.

During the first part of December the National Office moved to some new servers and rolled out a new **MensaForKids** website, which is the first of Mensa's websites designed to work on mobile devices. The website is sponsored by the Mensa Foundation and the Library of Congress, which is an exciting partnership. These are great steps towards closing the technology gap identified at our September meeting, and I look forward to seeing their progress.

Keeping in mind that the main benefit of Mensa memberships remains other members, I hope that those who have the opportunity will attend the "Sun-n
